

Driving and parking in Lincoln Park can be a real zoo. No other Chicago park has so many attractions...and so little parking. And the traffic can make you feel "beached" before you even see the lake.

So take our advice...take the CTA. All Lincoln Park attractions are easily reached by our buses and trains. You'll save time (compared to finding parking). You'll save money (compared to being ticketed or towed). And you'll save your sanity (compared to inhaling fumes while marooned). Especially during summer weekends...with so many BIG special events.

Besides, transit is convenient, economical, and fun. Just like your outing should be. So load up on Lincoln Park's fun, culture, excitement, and diversity...without your car becoming a beast of burden.

HOW TO USE CTA

The map inside shows which bus or train to take to each attraction. Park your car outside of this area and ride the rest of the way, or use CTA from your home. Many outlying rapid transit terminals have large parking lots, too...park all day for a buck!

All routes shown operate everyday, all day and evening, with just two exceptions: the Ravenswood 'L' south of Belmont, and the 11 Lincoln bus. See the map for details. Buses and trains run every few minutes.

Buses stop at posted signs about every other block. Bus operators will call out stops upon request. When taking trains, look for the signs at the station to determine which side to stand on and which train to take. Conductors call out the train stops, but watch for your station.

Fares are simple, too. \$1.00 for adults and 50¢ for ages 7 through 11. Under 7 is free. A transfer can be purchased at the start of your trip; this allows two additional rides within a two-hour period, except on the line you started on. Transfers cost 25¢ for adults, and 15¢ for ages 7 through 11. Exact fare is required on buses, but you can use dollar bills.

TAKE METRA TRAINS FROM SUBURBIA

It's surprisingly easy--and economical--to take the commuter train downtown and ride CTA to Lincoln Park. From most downtown terminals, it's just one bus to all the attractions shown here. Metra offers weekend and holiday family fares, and a variety of other discounts every day of the week. Relax and enjoy a train ride...instead of fighting traffic on HOT summer days. Easy directions are on the map inside!

GETTING TO LINCOLN PARK ATTRACTIONS

FROM DOWNTOWN

* 151 Sheridan north on State between Adams and Washington

FROM NORTH MICHIGAN AVENUE

* 151 Sheridan north on Michigan between Randolph and Oak



FROM TRAIN STATIONS

- * NorthWestern: Any bus eastbound on Washington to State; 151 northbound on State
- * Union: 151 Sheridan in front of station, southbound on Canal
- *LaSalle: 151 Sheridan east on Jackson (walk one block north from station on LaSalle)
- * Randolph: 151 Sheridan northbound on Michigan at Randolph

TRY THE

"CLYBOURN CONNECTION" From Chicago NorthWestern North & Northwest lines only: Get off at Clybourn & take the 73 Armitage bus going east on Cortland - just 15 minutes to the park!

Howard-Englewood-Jackson Park trains Service at all times

Ravenswood trains

No service south of Belmont later evenings or all day Sunday/Holiday

11 Lincoln bus

The easy connection from Fullerton "L" to the park. Weekend terminal is across from the park at Clark/Wisconsin, just one block south of Armitage (1900 North)

On Sundays/Holidays, buses 145 & 146 operate through Lincoln Park on Stockton instead of taking the Outer Drive
