

# INTRODUCTION

During 1996, paper transfers will be gradually replaced by the TRANSFER CARD on the entire CTA system.

A TRANSFER CARD costs and works the same as a paper transfer, allowing passengers two additional rides on other bus or train routes within two hours of purchase.

A TRANSFER CARD is the same size as a credit card and is constructed of a thin cardboard-like material, making it more durable than a paper transfer.







# Getting The Card

- O to any coin/token-accepting turnstile with the U-shaped bar above it.
- Deposit the exact full fare including transfer charge, in either coins or tokens.
- After you hear a beep, a **Transfer**Card will "pop up" from the top of
  the turnstile, just ahead of where you
  deposited your fare. The back of the
  card will show a four-digit station code
  and the expiration date/time.
- 4 Take the card and go through.



## Using The Card

Use the new **Transfer Card** in turnstiles or give it to station agents.

Insert Transfer Card into any turnstile with the U-shaped bar above it (into the same slot it "pops up" from).

Have the front of the card facing you, with the arrow pointing down, and magnetic stripe on the right. The machine will "grab" the card and read it.

On first use, a ride is electronically subtracted, and the card pops back up to you! The LED display will read:

# THANK YOU T 1 PLEASE ENTER

On the back of the card, a "1" will appear to the left of the expiration time. This indicates the card is valid for one more ride.

On the second use, the final ride is electronically subtracted, and the card again pops back up to you.

The LED display will read:

#### THANK YOU TØ PLEASE ENTER

On the back of the card, "VOID" will appear twice, covering the "1 EXP", indicating no more rides are left.

# Getting the Card

Instead of your bus operator handing you a punched paper transfer, here's what happens:

- The operator puts a card into the bus **Farecard Machine** attached to the right side of the farebox, as shown. The machine will activate the card.
- ❷ When the card pops up take it!

### Using the Card

If the bus does not have the Farecard Machine, the Transfer Card will be handled like a paper transfer.

If you board a bus that **does** have the **Farecard Machine**:

- Insert the **Transfer Card** as shown. The front of the card should face you, with the arrow pointing down and the magnetic stripe on the right. The machine will "grab" the card and read it.
- The first time the card is used, a ride is electronically subtracted, and the card pops back up to you. The LED display will read:

#### **THANK YOU T 1**

On the back of the card, the number "1" will appear to the left of the expiration time, indicating the card is valid for one more ride.

The second time the card is used in the machine, the voided card pops out the back of the machine to the operator. The LED display will read:

#### THANK YOU T Ø

This indicates there are no rides left.
The word **VOID** will appear twice
on the back of the card.

# Checking the Value

The number of rides remaining on the **Transfer Card** can be checked without removing any rides.

Just ask the operator to do so before you put the Transfer Card into the **Farecard Machine**.

- The operator will press a special button.
- Insert the card into the Farecard Machine.
- 1 The LED display will read:

1 TRF REMAIN

or

**2 TRF REMAIN** 

The card is then returned to you.
